

Letter From Laura

I grew up on Main Street in Urbana. Our father practiced internal medicine at Carle Hospital and would walk the few blocks to and from work. Our parents were in charge in our home, we were not. There was a place for everything, we had chores and there were high expectations. It was a happy home and childhood.

With structure comes routine and it never changed on Christmas mornings. Daddy would drink his coffee, read the paper and eat his breakfast v-e-r-y slowly. We were only allowed to get into our stockings. The timing of opening the presents waited on Daddy's schedule. After breakfast he would come down dressed in a suit to make his rounds at the hospital. He would be gone for at least two hours, sometimes more. When he got home, there would be fresh coffeecake and coffee waiting, a holiday treat. It was simply excruciating to watch him dawdle, listen to him talk to Mother, act like he couldn't see us. It never occurred to me that he might be teasing us! *Finally* he would call for his clipboard, paper, the ruler, pencils (which always needed more sharpening) and begin to draw his grid – the eight of us down the side, then eight of us across, with the names of assorted aunts and uncles added to the "across" line. This was for recording all gifts, which we opened one at a time and reported on. That way we could write all our thank you notes and check them off on the grid before we got to play with our new things. At *last* we got around to opening our presents! It was always worth the wait.

Christmas of 1995 we were at my Mother's. Every afternoon we would all leave the house so she would take a nap. Sam took the boys to the gym, and I put on my boots and followed my father's path over to Carle to call on a couple from Elwood, where I was the pastor of the only church in town. I always visited the whole town in the hospitals; someone knew I'd be in Urbana and asked me to stop by and visit these folks I hardly knew. Finding the wife in the cafeteria, we visited as she finished her rubbery turkey and then went up to ICU to see her husband. I stayed long enough that she eventually told me to get home, it was Christmas. The penny dropped. No wonder Daddy spent so long with his patients on Christmas day! He knew they wanted to be home, not in the hospital. What I had always thought of as a great disruption to our Christmas was him doing the right thing. He was being kind and taking time to bring a bit of cheer into someone's day. And then I thought back to the Christmas tables of our childhood, where we would have 20 or 24 for the meal. There would be servicemen from Chanute, our foreign students we always had from the university, and others invited for reasons known only to my parents. What lessons they taught us about hospitality and kindness and taking time to attend to others.

I am so thankful for these lessons caught, not taught, and for this behavior, which is exactly what we should do in church. Be hospitable and kind. Take time to attend to others. May it always be so for us in our life together.

Why We Didn't Sing Christmas Songs in Advent

Some of you may have been expecting nice renditions of *O Come All Ye Faithful* or *Joy to the World* during the services in early December this year. But as you may have noticed, those songs and songs like it were not sung until December 24th and the two Sundays following Christmas Eve. Let me tell you a little about why this happened.

The commercialization of Christmas has led to some confusion about how Christmas celebrations function within the church and outside of church. Outside of church it is clear how Christmas functions: you spend the most amount of money than any other month of the year, you decorate your house and tree, you listen to 24 hour non-stop Christmas music on the radio, you attend Christmas concerts, you watch movies like a "Christmas Story" and "It's a Wonderful Life", and you have family and work get-togethers. This may all be wonderful and fun, but it does not have much to do with how the church celebrates Christmas.

When the world amps up in the beginning of December with Amazon purchases, bright lights, and busy schedules, the church chooses to slow down and enters into a season of reflection and anticipation.

The way of the church is often not the way of the world.

Advent is the first season of the liturgical year, which is very significant because we start our year in a posture of openness to the revelation of Jesus Christ. This posture then sustains itself throughout the entirety of the liturgical year. Advent leads into the Christmas celebration and then continues into Christmastide. Christmas is not a day, it is a season! This year Sunday December 31st will be a Christmastide service (and Christmas songs will be sung) and then Epiphany begins January 6th (and Christmas songs are still sung in this service). Our consumerist tendencies are exacerbated during the world's season of Christmas. We want what we want and we want it in two days or less thanks to the wonder of Prime. But Advent invites us into a different way of looking at the world. The world sings "*It's the Most Wonderful Time of the Year*" and the church sings "*O Come O Come Emmanuel*". Advent invites us to look deep within ourselves and ask difficult questions like... "am I ready for the coming of Christ?" "do my values align with my actions" "what does repentance look like in my life?" or "are my bank statements a testament to faith in God?"

Next year during Advent 2018 I urge you to not follow the consumerist path of the world's version of Christmas. Anchor yourself in the season of Advent and then allow yourself the anticipated pleasure of celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ throughout the season of Christmastide.

NEW Medicare cards are coming!

Medicare will mail new Medicare cards between April 2018 and April 2019. Your new card will have a new Medicare Number that's unique to you, instead of your Social Security Number. This will help to protect your identity.

Things to know about your new Medicare card:

* You don't need to take any action to get your new Medicare card.

* The new card won't change your Medicare coverage or benefits.

* Medicare will never ask you to give personal or private information to get your new Medicare Number and card.

* There's no charge for your new card.

Watch out for scams:

Scam artists may try to get your current Medicare Number and other personal information by contacting you about your new Medicare card. They often claim to be from Medicare and use various scams to get your Medicare Number including:

* Asking you to confirm your Medicare or Social Security Number so they can send you a new card.

* Telling you there's a charge for your new card and they need to verify your personal information.

* Threatening to cancel your health benefits if you don't share your Medicare Number or other personal information. If someone calls you and asks for your Medicare Number or other personal information, hang up and call us at 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800 -633-4227).

How can I replace my Medicare card?

If your Medicare card is lost, stolen or damaged, you can ask Social Security for a new one.

* Your Medicare card will arrive in the mail in about 30 days.

* Social Security will mail your card to the address they have on file for you.

* If you need proof that you have Medicare sooner than 30 days, you can request a letter from Social Security. The letter will arrive in the mail in about 10 days.

* If you need proof immediately for your doctor or for a prescription, visit your local Social Security office.

How do I change my name or address?

Medicare uses the name and address you have on file with Social Security. To change your name and/or address, visit your online my Social Security account.



The Session met on Tuesday, December 19th and conducted the following business:

Welcomed elders-elect Debbie Hanson and Don Hartshorn and Kathy Lonn on behalf of Stewardship and Finance. Having named these things that we like going on around the church: the response to and help with the Family Christmas Shop, a full parking lot, visitors in church each week and lifting up Don and Jan Wagner as she is in hospice. The meeting was opened with prayer.

The minutes of the 11/21/2017 Session meeting and 12/3/2017 Congregational meeting were approved. Under the Clerk's Report, we noted the form for nominating folks to serve on presbytery committees, reviewed and corrected the 2018 Session roster, transferred John Warning to FPC, Gordon NE, approved the use of the sanctuary on June 9, 2018 by Rev. Laura to conduct the wedding of Jennifer Jordan and Michael Kull and restored and transferred Debbie Chance to Westminster, Peoria. We also noted the death of Cyrene Eberle on 12/12, the baptisms of Lucas Harrison and Lorelai Cole and the public reception of Brian Holfelner as a new member (the shelving he built for the children's worship activity books can be seen in the narthex!).

The Session acted to adopt the 2018 Budget and delegated to Rev. Laura the drafting of some letters and a follow up report for COM for Session comment and approval. We also approved the purchase of two new armchairs for the Narthex (monies have been set aside for this already) and approved the use of funds from the Ida Peters Fund to install a new fire alarm panel over the preschool's break time (approved by Properties in October).

The Session unanimously approved a report from Rev. Laura, following her New Officer Orientation Seminars, recommending that the Session proceed to the ordination of Tim Cole as an elder and the ordination of Bill Barrett, Betty Downard, Megan March and Nancy Thompson as deacons, also installing them along with those previously ordained to office: Deb Hanson, Don Hartshorn, Pam Madden and Alexis Maloof as elders and John Madden, Judi Beck, Audrey Beeney, Pat Bensing, Theresa Buley and Ann Gropp as deacons. All of them are to be ordained and/or installed on Sunday January 7, 2018.

The Session also received a written report from Rev. Laura on her November activities and received all the committee minutes listed on the docket from those committees having December meetings. Thanking Mike Brown, Rich Helm, Betty Pugh, Colleen Rouzer and Jim Sullivan for their faithful years of service, the meeting was closed with prayer at 8:20 p.m.
